In the second week of September, sixty-two freshmen assembled in the gymnasium to begin their firs year as high school students. At this first meeting with their sponsor, Mrs. Snell, the following people were elected to serve as officers for the entire school year, with the exception of George Oelrich, whose office was taken over by Mary Ellen Sawyer, when he moved away during the first semester.


Members of the class have been active in music, athletics, and the girls' athletic association. The class ha been well represented on the honor roll. Two students, Mary Peterson and Mary Ellen Sawyer, have been given recognition for their high scholastic record.


## FOOTBALL SEASON - 1946

Hawarden High opened the season at home against Cathedral High of Sioux Falls. We won with a score of 24-0. Cathedral was light in weight, but one of the largest crowds in years saw Hawarden play straight, but good, ball.

Leeds had 12 lettermen and a tricky team. They won the conference title for the first time. It was the first time in three years that we held speedy little Johnny Thacker from scoring. We played a good game, but their power was just too much for us. The final score was 14-6 in favor of Leeds. The Leeds High coach stated we were the best team they had played all season.

Due to the death of an Elk Point player from injuries in their Centerville game, the Elk Point-Hawarden game was called off originally and twice postponed. We scored as many points as we did in the last five gimes with them. It was the first time in seven years (two years were tied) since we defeated them. The score was 24-6.

St. Mary's from Emmetsburg filled the original Elk Point date, being the first time Hawarden over played an Emmetsburg team. Hawarden was victorious with a wide margin-31-0. Roger Miller ran 60 yards to score. The St. Marys team had held Trinity of Sioux City the previous week, 13-0.

There were several long runs in the Canton game by Wheeler, Schwiesow, and Keith Storm. The field was soaked from recent rains but we defeated them by the largest score in the 28 games we have played with Canton-49-0.

The South Sioux City game was hard fought, having been postponed from Friday to Monday. We played at South Sioux and "brought home the bacon"-20-0.

Four days after the South Sioux victory came the Vermillion game. The first half ended 6-0, but with their passes and drive they outplayed us. Each team made 12 first downs and the game was closer than the 32-0 score indicates.

We defeated Rock Rapids for the eleventh consecutive year, 19-0. They have scored in but 4 of these games, and a single touchdown each time. We scored twice in the first quarter, the second score on a 30 -yard run by Burt Britzmann. A long-scoring run by Storm was lost by a penalty.

Sheldon had their best team in years. The first time we had possession of the ball, Schwiesow ran 50 yards to score. In the fourth quarter, Britzmann-to-Miller passes brought us to the 15 -yard line where Miller ran the remaining distance. Sheldon went down in defeat, 12-2.

Akron was undefeated in Iowa competition until they met us. The snow had been scraped from the field but it was sloppy. Britzmann passed to Miller in the first quarter for a score. Two more touchdowns were made in the fourth quarter. We held them for 4 downs on the 2 -yard line. A lot of advanced comment was favoring Akron. They did have their best team in years but Hawarden over-powered them to the tune of 21-0.

Hawarden had its best team in years. We became the fourth Hawarden team in our football history to win 8 games-1911, 1923, 1924, 1946, and the third Hawarden team to hold 6 opponents scoreless-1925, 1931, 1946. We finished higher in the conference than since 1941.
