Oh! the merry day that our parents led us by the hand, up the gangplank of the Boat of Knowledge to begin our cruise which was to last for twelve years. Fifty-three of ushowled our indignation at this fateful step in our careers to Miss Green our first skipper. Fourteen of those original starters have continued on the voyage all the way. During those early years we took on several new passengers who had deserted other ships to sail withus. Some, too, became seasick and dropped out along the way. About this time we had the luck to have as skipper, Miss Hilton, who had the reputation for steering wanderers through straight and narrow channels. We also had such inspiring teachers as Miss Willemsen, Miss Lynott, and Mrs. Snell.

Along about Port Seven and Eight, we established a weekly newspaper. This "scandal" sheet was faithfully typed each week by Miss Sherard. Mrs. Snell helped us organize "The Book Club" which didmuch to further our interest along the lines of literature.

Upon reaching Port Eight the first portion of our journey came to an end. Joining with others of our age from other boats, we boarded a larger and mightier ship which was to transport us for the remainder of our voyage-High School. To reach fulfillment of our trip we had to pass, first, through stormy and turbulent seas, infested with pirates. After several minor skirmishes in which some of our members were abducted only to be ransomed by obedience, we settled down to smoother sailing. Seventy-two of us sailedfor Port Nine under Mrs. Snell's direction and elected as officers Dick Ball, president; Burt Britzmann, vice president; Milton Keizer, secretary-treasurer; and Jackie Harrison, student council representative. Unusually fine class spirit was evidenced that first year and has continued throughout our voyage.

As we headed for Port Ten, Miss Geisler assumed command and new officers elected were Jackie Harrison, president; Marba Mallette, vice president; Keith Eilers, secretary-treasurer; and Violet Emmers, student council representative.

In our eleventh year at sea we played an even greater part in the affairs of our ship. We produced under the direction of Miss Wollman the play, "A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court," in the ship's theater. Minor obstacles such as a case of chicken pox and injuries sustained in a fight made it necessary to postpone the play. But it was worth waiting for as it became one of the biggest dramatic successes of recent years. This cruise was climaxed by some very fancy entertaining on our part: the Junior-Senior banquet and prom. The theme "music" was admirably carried out in the decorations, food, and speeches. A seven piece orchestra furnished the music beneath brilliant streamers and soft lighting in the gym. Officers were for the year Connie Hove, president; Jackie Harrison, vice president; Ruth Harris, secretary-treasurer; and Charlene Boty, student council representative.

Our class has steered the ship on a course of unprecedented fame and honor. First and foremost we reached 28,000 feet heights in scholarship. During our four years we placed an average of twelve on the honor roll each quarter. Hardly a quarter went by when we didn't have three or more people on the "A" roll. In the Iowa Development Tests, given each year we ranked as follows: Freshman, 90 percentile; Sophomore, 99 percentile; Junior, 93 percentile; Senior, 94 percentile. Nor did we spend all of our time studying. We ambitiously and successfully engaged in every activity offered in overwhelming numbers. We brought recognition to our school in athletics, music, and speech.

On May 27 of this year the ship will come to its last and final port. Here we will receive our diplomas, crediting us with the completion of our journey successfully. The passengers will separate and go their many different ways but each one will always hold dear to his heart the memory of the voyage we made together. Others will take our places on the good ship "H. H. S." It is pur sincere hope that they will strive to the utmost to carry on the grand traditions we have begun: To excell always in every line. Satisfaction of work well done will be the reward.





A skating party held at the Canton rink was the highlight of en-


tertainment as Sophomores.

The students had a class party shortly after school beganin order to become better acquainted.


For the Christmas assembly program several students of the class presented a skit entitled "Father's Christmas Troubles."








1948 COMET FOOTBALL IN REVIEW

After four weeks of strenuous workouts, the Comets traveled to Worthington, Minnesota for the opening game of the 1948 gridiron season. Worthington employed the famed "XYZ" offense and had not been defeated in the last two seasons. The game was exceptionally well played for the initial game of the season, but the Comets displayed superior power by defeating the Minnesota boys 12-6. Hawarden scored in the first and fourth periods, while Worthington's lone counter came in the third quarter. For the first game of the season, the Blue and White looked very polished under the tutorship of their new coach, Aaron Linn.


The Leeds Lancers wilted before a blistering attack of speed and deception the following week, as the Comets continued on the victory trail to the tune of 39-7. It took the Comets only three plays to score their first touchdown of the game, from then on to the final whistle the Lancers were unable to halt the Comets. Hawarden's forward wall displayed effective defensive strength by holding the Lancers to no first downs via the ground route. Paul Rush was the outstanding lineman of the game.

The following week an over-confident Hawarden eleven took the field against the Sibley Generals. On the first play from scrimmage Britzmann rambled 65 yards for a touchdown, to put the Comets ahead 6-0. For the remainder of the first half, Sibley overpowered the Hawarden team. The half ended 7-6 in favor of the Generals. In the third quarter Sibley intercepted a Comet forward pass, and returned it for a touchdown to put them ahead 14-6. Although the Blue and White were able to make yardage at will, they could not push across a counter until the last 30 seconds. The extra point was good, but not enough to keep the Comets from going down to defeat, 14-13.

The fans at Mapleton saw an injury-ridden Comet eleven come through with a narrow 14-13 victory. The Blue and White scored twice in the first half: on a pass to Hove, and on a long touchdown drive. In the last half, the Comets were unable to penetrate to pay dirt while Mapleton scored twice. Ericson stopped the Maples try for the crucial extra point.

Due to the severe polio epidemic in the community, the remainder of the football schedule was cancelled. Thus the curtain came down on the 1948 gridiron season. The Comets scored 78 points, to 40 for their opponents.

Four Comets were honored on the All Conference Team. They were Dean Storm, end; Paul Rush, guard; Burt Britzmann, quarterback; and Keith Eilers, tackle.





DEBATE



Under the direction of R. F. Fanslow, debate coach, the Hawarden High School debate team, composed of Connie Hove and Jack Ruttan, affirmative, and Burt Britzmann and Dick Ball, negative, opened the season by participating in a non-decision, three school tournament at Canton, South Dakota in early January. The question for debate was Resolved: That The United Nations Now Be Revised into a Federal World Government.

The first decision tourney of the year that we attended was the Madison invitational at Madison, South Dakota. Seventeen schools were represented from all parts of South Dakota, Minnesota, and Iowa. We finished a close second behind Mitchell, winning seven out of eight debates.

The team traveled to Beresford next where we debated Canton, Vermillion, and Beresford before the students of Beresford High School. We won four out of four to capture the tournament.

Our own school was the scene of the next tourney on February 19. After an intense, all-day struggle, we emerged the victors with a six out of eight record. Participating schools in addition to Hawarden were Vermillion, Canton, Augustana Academy, and Beresford.

At the Midwest Speech Tourney the following week in Sioux Falls, we met the finest competition in the area. Due to a basketball conflict we were unable to debate one round and, as a result, had to forfeit it, thus hindering our chances of winning. Nevertheless, we won six out of seven actual debates. Jack Ruttan tied for first place in speaker ratings.

The regular season about completed we now turned our attention to the task of winning the district. In that meet held at Hawarden, we won all six of our debates and scored a grand total of 319 points. Hull Western Christian and Leeds High of Sioux City finished in a tie for second. All three schools represented the Northwest District in the state finals at Iowa City.

At the State Finals in Iowa City on March 30-April 2, the team, composed of Hove, Ruttan, Britzmann, and Ball won the Class B Championship of Iowa. Jack Ruttan received a superior speaker ranking and Dick Ball an excellent. Dick Ball won second place in Extemporaneous Speaking. Hawarden defeated teams from Leeds, St. Patricks of Waukon, Eldora, Thompson, Hull, Osage, and University High of Iowa City, the latter three being defeated twice each.

The victory is in keeping with the unparalleled Hawarden tradition. In the last seven state debate tournaments in which the school has participated it has won five times and placed second twice. This record is unequalled by any other Class B school in the state.
