## SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

In 1937, The War Department of Hawarden, our parents, decided to send a company of junior size soldiers out to do battle with school.

Of this sturdy company of forty soldiers, four have survived the entire twelve years of battle. These battle-scarred veterans are, Dolores Haines, Dona Swanson, Wanda Janvrin and Dick Swift.

Our first two years were spent in basic training in preparation for the battles to come. It was during our second battle when Col. Snell became our commanding officer and has kept her officiating rank throughout our entire warfare. Miss Hilton took the rating of Commander-in-Chief, in leading the troops through their first eight battles.

As we trudged through the cities which made up our third battle, we camped long enough to help build a museum which was made up of souvenirs provided by each of the soldiers of the third troop. This was a great prize to the War Department and they were very proud.

With each soldier contributing his musical ability, a company Rhythm Band was organized. At the end of each battle, we entertained our War Department with small concerts. The Band has grown throughout our years and has attained great honors.

As a result of our first eight battles, the weary soldiers were presented with their transfer papers (diplomas) to a new, and unknown battleground.


Gallantly we marched into this new territory where our company was reinforced with recruits from St. Mary's and surrounding rural schools, which increased our number to sixty-two soldiers. General Snell led us into our ninth combat with Jo Ann Smith, Tom Tilgner, Dolores Haines, and Mary Ellen Sawyer as company commanders. During this battle, twelve of our soldiers were captured by spies of different territories. Dances were sponsored by the Canteen to help break the monotony and strain.

In the tenth battle, Miss Geith took the rank of general and led us through the first half of our battle, but we lost her and she was replaced by Mr. Schafer. Officers in charge were Tom Tilgner, Mary Ellen Sawyer, Don Petry and Wanda Janvrin. We had only one casualty as a result of this battle.

Our last reinforcements were received in the eleventh battle. During the conflict a soldier looked out from where we were entrenched and yelled, "It's a bomb! "NO--It was Otis! As the battle neared the end, Norman Houk "scootered" into camp with Gerald Erickson in the side car, to help us with the fight. General Snell again joined us with Don Petry, Ray Ney, Mary Peterson and Mary Sawyer to take command. In celebration of the winning of our eleventh battle, a "Prom" was sponsored by the rookies in the canteen with great success. Also as encouragement for the weary soldiers, the play "Lady Be Good" brought a huge crowd to the canteen door.

Tom Tilgner, Don Petry, Ray Ney, and Mary Peterson, under the command of General Richards, led us into our last battle. The battle was halted by a group of amateur actors and actresses who presented the play "Dora Dean" to the remaining fatigued soldiers and members of the War Department. As a reward for services rendered during twelve years of active duty, we were granted a furlough of one day. (Skip Day). In honor of our past victories, the rockies sponsored a banquet and prom. A short time later, we were presented with out honorable discharge papers.

Now we have finished our war, a long siege of twelve years. Our War Department is satisfied with the campaign we have carried on, and, as the troops disband and go their separate ways, we feel that we actually have won.






SENIOR CLASS PLAY


Scholastically, we have done well, and, in addition, we have been active in music, library, and sports. Individual members have earned let-

## JUNIOR CLASS PLAY



It was a well-known hit and contained many humorous scenes throughout the entire play.



# Review of 1949 Football Season

A surprised Worthington eleven met with a moral defeat as the Comets tied them, 12 to 12, in what proved to be the first bad mark against them since their defeat by us last year. The Comets, light and inexperienced due to last year's short season and the graduation of eleven lettermen, proved to have more ability than was expected against a highly touted Worthington team. Eldon Eilers scored on an intercepted pass early in the game but the score was tied by a sustained Trojan drive in the second period. In the third period Tom Tilgner scored on a line plunge to give the Comets a 12 to 6 advantage. A bad break gave Worthington its typing score in the fourth quarter and neither team was able to break the deadlock. For Coach Arnold Cook, the season's prospects looked bright.

These prospects were short-lived, however, as the Leeds Lancers overpowered the Blue and White in a smashing 44-0 defeat. The hard-hitting Lancers scored almost at will, while the Comets just couldn't get started. Most of the Comet yardage came through passes but we never seriously threatened the Lancer goal.

The following week found Hawarden and Hartley playing on eventerms in every department except the score, with Hartley coming out on top with a 20-7 count. The only Comet score came in the third quarter on a pass from Tilgner to Beck, but other scoring chances were muffed through costly fumbles.

The Mapleton tilt saw the Blue and White gain their only victory. Early in the game the Comets made a seventy yard sustained march with George Rehder going over from the five. Another Hawarden score was called back on a holding penalty giving the Comets a slim 7-0 edge at halftime. The third period saw the Mapleton eleven convert a costly Comet fumble into a touchdown, tying up the game. The Blue and White came back late in the fourth period on a forty three yard gallop by Adrian Kool, breaking the 7-7 deadlock. The game ended with the Comets on top with a 14-7 count.


The injury-ridden Comet eleven, minus Venard and Petry, suffered a 33 to 6 pasting in the hands of the South Sioux powerhouse. Statistically, the Blue and White outdowned the Cardinals 12 to 9, but long South Sioux runs erased this edge. Tilgner scored the only Comet touchdown on a one yard plunge near the end of the game. Marlin Schwiesow played an outstanding game on defense, possibly preventing Cardinal touchdowns.

The fans at Vermillion saw the Comets put up a game battle before going down in defeat by a 32-13 count. The Comets were plagued by costly interceptions and fumbles which set up most of the Vermillion scores. The Blue and White hit pay dirt twice, on a lateral to George Rehder and a pass from Tilgner to Beck. Coach Cook thought the Comets looked better on both defense and offense.


The Homecoming tilt against Paulina saw the Comets take a heartbreaking 6-0 loss. The Blue and White outplayed Paulina in the first down and total yardage departments, but the visitors tightened up when we threatened their goal and the Comets just couldn't push the pigskin across, the half ending with Hawarden on Paulina's one foot line.

In the last game of the year, Rock Rapids defeated the Comets by an inglorious 30 to 0 score. The game was played without the services of the two regular ends, Kool and Beck who were both out with broken fingers suffered in the Paulina game.

Although suffering a losing season, the Comets were provided with a considerable amount of knowledge and experience which should result in a winning team in the near future.




