South Sioux City was our Homecoming foe, and with the best team in their history, outscored us 13-7 in a hard fought battle. Freshman Ray Gaul hauled in a 10 yard pass for our only score.

Vermillion was fired up for their Homecoming, and Hawarden had to fight hard for a 7-0 victory.

Next on the schedule was Gehlen of LeMars. Keith Waterman, Hawarden's All-Conference back, scored all five touchdowns as he lead the Comets to a $32-7$ victory.

The winless Lions from Rock Rapids met with their seventh straight setback against a determined Hawarden squad. The game ended with Hawarden on the long end of a 38-7 score.

The Siouxland Conference Championship and the famed Wooden Shoes were at stake as the Comets met the heavy Dutchmen squad of Orange City. A deficit of thirty-two pounds per man plus a speedy backfield proved to be just too much for the hardfighting blue and white team to overcome and fell by a 12-6 score.

The Elk Point Pointers, who outweighed us 30 pounds per man, were out to end their season with a victory. The strong Pointers, having lost but two games in the last four years suffered their third against the strong Hawarden eleven by a score of $32-12$.
