
















Later in the year, the members turned their attention to the concert band. They joined the vocal music department in presenting the Christmas and Spring concerts.


For the final event of the year, the band marched in the Memorial Day parade in both Ireton and Hawarden.






French Club



Social Studies

This year there were six courses in the field of social studies, three of which are required for graduation. The three required courses are world history, American history, and American government, while the three optional ones are psychology, economics, and sociology, all semester courses.

The sophomores' study of the history of the world begins in the Stone Age and ends in the 1950's. It covers the Golden Age of Greece, the Dark Ages, the Renaissance, and all the other periods in history throughout the world.

The juniors carefully study the development of the American democracy, the administration of each president, and the different conditions which have influenced American economy.

Government, a semester course for seniors, informs the student of the mechanics involved in operating our nation, and psychology gives the causes of, effects of, and possible solutions for many American problems.

In economics one learns how the government and the individual are financed. Sociology, the second semester, is a study of people living together.



Mathematics

West Sioux's mathematics program includes courses suited to the needs and abilities of all. A student who is concentrating on commercial or vocational training may wish to take general math his freshman year and business math sometime in the course of his next three years in high school, whereas another, who is preparing for college, may prefer to study freshman algebra, plane and solid geometry, intermediate algebra, and advanced mathematics.

Among the extra activities in this academic area are a math club with two years of college preparatory math as a requirement for membership, a special course for freshmen from the School Mathematics Study Group, and the math contest and science fair at the University of South Dakota.



Science

General Science, biology, chemistry, and physics are offered by the West Sioux science department. General science and any one of the other three courses are required for graduation.

Each year the four science classes combine to present the big scientific event of the year at West Sioux, the science fair. This event necessitates much work, and preparations are made months ahead of time. During these weeks and months each student devotes the majority of his after-school time and many of his study halls to working on his project and striving for perfection.

When the projects are finally arranged in the high school gym, they may range from the synthetic crystals made by a junior chemist to an electric motor put together in the physics laboratory to a diagram of the parts of the human body drawn by a biology student. A few of the better projects proceed the science fair at SUSD in Vermillion to compete with projects of other students in the four-state area.

Language Skills

Four years of English, three years of French, a course in speech, constitute West Sioux's department in the language skills.

Freshman English is, like all four English courses, a combination of both grammar and literature. One of the high points of the year is reached when the class reads a condensed version of GREAT EXPECTATIONS. Sophomores read SILAS MARNER and JULIUS CAESAR, juniors make a study of American literature, and seniors read and discuss world literature.

The first year of French is spent studying some of the basic rules of grammar and pronunciation along with reading and translation of some simple literature, while the second year includes more advanced grammar, reading, and translation, featuring an excerpt from LES MISERABLES. Third-year French is primarily more advanced translation and a review of previous study.

The speech students study and practice in a wide variety of fields, including discussion, debate, drama, interpretation, declamation, and radio. Through this course students gain experience in speaking before a group, learn to express themselves more correctly, develop an interest in one of the important problems of the day, and reveive a background for the contest work in which the speech club participates.


Commercial

Commercial courses include typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, and office practice. These subjects are offered for those students who wish to enter the business world after their graduation. When taking these courses, they learn to do production work, take dictation, transcribe letters, keep accurate records, and work efficiently in an office. Records of progress in these courses are charted, and the students are able to observe their improvement and standing among their classmates. This often stimulates increased effort as do the awards for typing and shorthand presented on the final day of school.

Vocational

The vocational courses are designed to give the student practical training in industrial arts, agriculture, homemaking, and art.

Freshman boys must take either industrial arts or agriculture. Industrial arts involves learning and practicing the techniques of woodworking. The students projects range from the very simple ones to those requiring a great deal of skill and knowledge. In his agriculture class, a boy is trained in farming and related careers. He is instructed in engine repair, farm maintenance, and animal feeding. The FFA is open to him if he wishes to extend his training.

Freshman girls are required to take home economics and may continue their domestic training if interested. The first year gives simple instruction in cooking, sewing, and other basic duties of a homemaker. Following courses feature advanced training in these same fields. FHA provides the girls with an opportunity to broaden their interest and knowledge.

Students who like to draw, paint, and/or mold enjoy taking the art course offered at West Sioux. It gives creative pupils an opportunity to display and develop their talents by means of various projects. Contest work during the year serves as an incentive for accomplishment.






Football

The Falcons scored a crushing victory over the Akron Red Raiders in the third game of the season. 



Basketball


Gehlen encountered the Falcons for the second time and broke the West Sioux winning streak. The Falcons were outpointed 64-50.





The season opened at the Holstein Relays with West Sioux taking fourth place. Two West Sioux records were broken: Ed Eneboe in the mile with a 4:35, and Bruce Waterman in the low hurdles with 21:5.

At the tri-angular meet with Sheldon and Le Mars, West Sioux placed second with 47 points.

The third meet was at Cherokee. Ed Eneboe won the mile with a time of 4:42.

West Sioux placed third in the Central Lyon Relays. The 880 relay team (Waterman, Vander Hamm, Twedt, and Schumacher) topped the school record with a time of 1:37.2. Ed Eneboe made a new school and meet record in the pole vault with a leap of 11'4." Larry Smith with a 193' toss also topped the record in the football throw.

Des Moines was the scene of the next meet. Ed Eneboe broke the school record with a 4:33 for the mile at the Drake Relays.

West Sioux placed third at Milford with three school records being broken: the medley relay team with a 3:53. Butch Strong in the high jump of 5'7," and Ed Eneboe with 11'5" in the pole vault.

The Siouxland conference meet finished with West Sioux capturing second place and 81 1/2 points. Larry Smith set a new conference and school record in the football throw with a heave of 210'7." The medley team set a new record of 3:47. Two other West Sioux records were also broken: Bruce Waterman in the broad jump with 19'10" and Don Abbott in the discus with 115'7."

Ed Eneboe finished first in the state Class A mile run setting a new record for himself and for West Sioux at Iowa City with a 4:31.9.

The total points scored this year by the track seniors were: Eneboe, 108; Twedt, 71; Vander Hamm, 45; Bruxvoort, 18; Rounds, 11; Waggoner, 10; Vellinga, 7; Rozell, 3.

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
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
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
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This yearbook is an attempt to capture the events of the 61-62 school year; the year the new high school building was erected and the old closed.
